parts of our lives over the past year whether this is bereavement, illness, depression or disappointment. We can be sure that Jesus will always accompany us through our doubts, difficulties and challenges.

Whether we are working from home or are out and about, we are entitled to give ourselves some "time out" during Advent to reflect on the reality of Christmas and what it means for us as Christian people. I believe that we need to reclaim Advent as a much-needed space to reflect on our faith.

Today's Gospel tells us to "*Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.*" This reminds us that we are passing through this World and need to make the most of the gifts and opportunities that God has given to each and every one of us.

Our first reading today from Prophet Jeremiah reminds us of the coming Saviour "*I will make a virtuous Branch grow for David, who shall practice honesty and integrity in the land.*" During Advent, let us allow ourselves some moments of stillness and quiet, so that we can listen to what God may be saying to us at this time of the year.

There are practical ways in which we could make this Advent more meaningful. Perhaps we could attend mass more regularly (in person or online with our parish webcam which can be accessed from our website http://whitehall.dublindiocese.ie) and make it a time of prayer and reflective anticipation. If we are sending Christmas Cards why not choose cards with a distinctly religious theme and message.

Also it is a time for giving and sharing with those in need. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul collection, which will take place in our churches on Sunday, December 11th, will provide us with an opportunity to help the most in need in our community.

Speaking on Tuesday Pope Francis said: "Advent is the period which every year introduces us to Christmas and its mystery. This year too its lights will be subdued due to the consequences of the pandemic, which still weighs on our time. All the more reason we are called not to lose hope. The feast of the Birth of Christ does not clash with the trial we are experiencing because it is the feast of compassion, of tenderness par excellence. Its beauty is humble and full of human warmth."

I wish you all a peaceful and holy Advent.

When walking around the shopping centres in the last week or so, you would be forgiven for thinking that Christmas has already arrived. The Christmas trees are up, the lights are on and there are plenty of appealing window displays from which to choose gifts.

However, from a Christian

perspective, the crib in Bethlehem is still empty, the shepherds have not heard the voice of the angels and the star has yet to rise to tell the three wise men of the birth of Jesus.

There is a sense in our society that things have to happen almost instantly. We have lost the sense of quiet anticipation. And I think that's what Advent, which only lasts for four weeks, is trying to teach us.

Advent marks the beginning of the new Church year when our Sunday gospel readings change from Mark to Luke. So, in a way, we turn a page today as we start the new liturgical year. A fresh start is always a good opportunity for reflection, thankfulness and hope for our future.

Father Kieran O'Mahony says: "If you were to wish people a Happy New Year today, they would in all probability find it

awkward. Nevertheless, we do start a new Christian year with the season of Advent. The different seasons remind us of important aspects of being Christian, one of which is the conviction that we may always begin again and start anew. Last Sunday, we looked back and today we look forward: what are our hopes for the coming Christian year?"

Advent is a season of joyful hope. Its deliberately short – just four weeks – allowing us just enough time to reflect on the coming of Jesus to us at Christmas. And I'm sure there was never a year when we more needed to share the news of the birth of Christ at Christmas with family, friends and neighbours.

The light and hope of Advent is symbolised by the lighted candles from our Advent wreath which can shine Christ's love into the darker


