“No servant can be the slave of two masters”

18th September 2022

In the Gospel today, Jesus presents us with a real-world dilemma. He tells us that *“No servant can be the slave of two masters; he will either hate the first and love the*

second or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money”.

This reading speaks about the importance of relationships over money. The steward in our Gospel realises this and calls in his master’s debtors to reduce the amounts they owe. Jesus acknowledges that this is a clever strategy as it means that they will be more likely to help him when he is out of a job.

The steward also realises that at times of crisis its our networks of friends and family that really make a difference. No amount of money will heal and support us in the way a good friend can do in a time of need.

In this Gospel reading, Jesus is telling us to get our priorities right.

This reminds us of the story of

Martha and Mary in St. Luke’s Gospel where we are told that *“Martha was distracted by her many tasks.”* Jesus tells

her *“You are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing.”*

The reading also addresses the interaction between the church and the world of work. Which should take priority?

As I have a full-time job, my ministry is for the most part focused on weekends. My main role is baptism preparation with families and the celebration of the sacrament. This is a great opportunity to share sacramental joy with families many of whom are not regular churchgoers and to hopefully give a positive impression of ministry in the church today that will assist them on their journey of faith.

I can be an important witness to the

faith in the busy world of work today. It can be very beneficial to have a Christian presence in large corporations. Although, I have not been called upon very often, at time of baptisms and bereavement in particular I have been called upon to provide support, advice and assistance.

As a Permanent Deacon, I act as a bridge between the world work and that of the church. I can be present in certain situations where a priest may not be there to assist and encourage people at significant times in their lives. I think that the right approach is to do what I can and to leave the rest to God's grace.

Jesus is telling us to focus on the values of his Kingdom and on living a good Christian life and that, in return, he will accompany us and he will care for us. In our First Reading today, the prophet Amos criticises people to "trample the poor". Speaking on the same theme in Mauritius last week, Pope Francis spoke about the exploitation of the poor, the environment and our natural resources: *"I want to encourage you not to yield to the temptation of an idolatrous economic model that feels the need to sacrifice human lives on the altar of speculation and profit alone, considering only immediate advantage to the detriment of protecting the poor, the environment and its resources."*

It is important to reflect on these comments and see how we can put them into practice in our own lives. Whether its by highlighting issues in the developing world or simply being more careful about recycling and using less plastic which is so damaging to our oceans.

Thomas Merton said: *"We all need enough silence and solitude in our lives to enable the deep inner voice of our true self to be heard at least occasionally."*

Let us pray that in the coming week we discern the right balance between the working and spiritual parts of our lives so that the gifts that God has given us may be of service to the church also to those we meet in the different circumstances in which we encounter them. We should, of course, engage with the world in various way but not become overly dominated by it to the expense of living out our faith in a positive way.
