2nd Sunday of Advent

4th December 2022

"People of faith waited many centuries for the coming of the Messiah."

"The message of Advent doesn't fit neatly into a sound-bite or vignette. It's too complex, too deep, to compete with glitter and noise; and it's a hard sell in a culture that would rather skip straight to the big finish. But Advent is too important to be forgotten, because it is this season that prepares us to encounter our Lord."

Our Gospel today has a strong Advent theme where John the Baptist asks for a conversion of our hearts and also of the way that we live our lives. Today we light the second candle on our Advent wreath a sign that the light and hope of Christmas draws ever nearer to us. He tells us: *"I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with*

the Holy Spirit and fire."



It's a Gospel that I often read at Baptisms as I think it's a real call to mission and to ministry for us all. Each of us has a very important part to play in the great story of salvation which we may not fully appreciate in this life.

The message of Isaiah in our First Reading is most certainly one of hope. People of faith waited many centuries for the coming of the Messiah. There was a long period of expectation before the birth of our Saviour. In this reading, we are told *"A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse...on him the Spirit of the Lord rests."* God is true to his promises and Jesus was born at the appointed time.

The Church gives us the Season of Advent at a very busy time of the year when we have a lot of things to do. We are run off our feet

buying presents, shopping, meeting friends and attending Christmas events. We recently had “Black Friday” in our shops and shopping centres, an idea that has reached us from America. The idea is to encourage people to do their Christmas shopping a bit earlier and to make significant savings.

Advent is calling us then to reach out to others. Perhaps that may to people who have become lost on their journey of faith, the lonely, the bereaved and those who find life challenging for different reasons. The light of Advent, which is symbolised by the candles on our Advent wreath, gives us hope at this time of the year as the evenings get shorter. It’s a good reason to get out and about in the middle of the day if we can. The Advent wreath reminds us that God is always present in our darkness and that his loving presence never leaves us. In less than a month, from December 22nd, the days will gradually get longer again as the low light of the coming Spring begins to extend slowly.

Advent provides us with an opportunity to grow in faith individually and as a community. We should all allow time for some prayer and reflection during these four weeks. It may help to read a book such as “*Dipping into Advent*” by Father Alan Hilliard which is published by Messenger Publications. In fact, we might buy a second copy and share it with a family member, friend or neighbour.

The scripture scholar, Father Kieran O’Mahony describes Advent well when he says: “*the Advent call is to wake up from our slumbers. Metanoia (conversion or repentance) means a whole change of mindset, going right down to the roots of our being. It’s the only project. Of course, it takes time, but the time is now*”.

This is particularly appropriate in the light of the Archbishop’s letter entitled “*The Time Has Come*” which was distributed and read in churches throughout the Diocese last weekend in which new parish structures are proposed.

Archbishop Farrell writes:

“Within each partnership of parishes, Parish Pastoral Councils, all active parishioners, priests, deacons, parish pastoral workers and voluntary parish leaders, including catechists into the future, are encouraged to renew the missionary aspect of parish life and contribute energetically towards the partnership of local parishes.”



As we begin the last month of the year, let us give thanks to God for all the graces and blessings that we have received and to ask for his assistance as we move forward on our Christian pilgrimage during this Season of Advent.
